#### KYCC IS FOUNDED LO

1979

KYCC opened its doors as Korean Youth Center (KYC) on February 14, 1975, at 932 S. Crenshaw Blvd., establishing culturally relevant after school programs for youth and education workshops for parents.

# KOREAN YOUTH CENTER

#### **COUNSELING SERVICES BEGIN**

KYC receives an AB90 grant through the Los Angeles County Department of Community Development to begin counseling services in 1979.

#### 1980'S KOREATOWN OFFICIALLY RECOGNIZED

The City of LA officially designates Koreatown as a neighborhood. By the end of the 1980's, its Korean American population was the 4th largest Asian Pacific group in Southern California and had grown by 700%.

#### **KYC MOVES TO OXFORD**

KYC moved to 309 South Oxford Avenue. At this location, KYC grew to have its presence in Koreatown, as a community and drop-in center for young, recently immigrated Korean American youth.

#### **RISING JUVENILE DELINQUENCY ISSUES**

Juvenile delinguency is a rising problem in the Korean American community, with youth facing assimilation problems. That year, KYC handled 52 cases involving arrests, runaways, theft, burglary, truancy, and drug abuse.

#### **KYC BECOMES INDEPENDENT**

On August 20, 1982 KYC is incorporated as an independent nonprofit agency to provide comprehensive youth services to the Korean community.

On April 29, 1992 rioting, looting, burning and killing devastated Koreatown for six days. With the acquittal of four LAPD officers who brutally beat Rodney King, South LA residents took to the streets in outrage and frustration. Koreatown suffered disproportionately, as 2,280 Korean American businesses were looted and burned, estimating \$400 million in property damages. In the Korean American community, the Los Angeles civil unrest is remembered as Sa-i-gu, translated literally as 4-2-9, referencing April 29 in Korean.

#### ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT UNIT LAUNCHES

Following the devastation of Sa-i-gu, KYCC added its Neighborhood Economic Development program, providing counseling and assistance to small business owners.

#### **KYC EXPANDS ITS NAME**

On October 15, 1992, the KYC Board of Directors added "Community" to our name, becoming Korean Youth and Community Center, recognizing the organization's expanded direction and commitment to serving all ethnic groups in Koreatown.

#### WATER CONSERVATION INITIATIVE GROWS

In 1993, KYCC became one of the lead organizations in the LADWPs Low Flush Toilet Exchange program. At the end of the 15-year program—the largest water conservation program to date—KYCC gave away over 1.2 million free lowflush toilets and showerheads.



#### **ENVIRONMENTAL SERVICES UNIT FORMS**

In 1993, KYCC's 1319 Pico Boulevard location was leased, and KYCC Environmental Services (ES) was formed. Still operating out of this location, ES has expanded its graffiti removal, tree planting and water conservation programs.



#### **MOVING TO WILTON PLACE**

Our staff move into the KYC Limited Partnership, a 19-unit low-income apartment building at 680 S. Wilton Place, marking a shift in the organization's priorities towards housing development.

#### HOLIDAY TRADITION BEGINS

KYCC held its first Holiday Carnival, a staff-led event hosted as a way to give back to our clients. Over the years, it has grown to host over 2,000 children and their families.

#### YOUTH LEADERSHIP PROGRAM LAUNCHES

KYCC launched a pilot project to provide culturally sensitive leadership development for young Korean Americans. An iteration of the Korean American Youth Leadership Program is still in existence, run by the K.W. Lee Center for Leadership.

#### YOUTH DRUG ABUSE PREVENTION

To raise awareness about issues related to tobacco, alcohol, and drug use among Korean American teenagers, KYCC established the Youth Drug Abuse Prevention Project (YDAPP) with 13 high school students.



#### **RENO AFFORDABLE HOUSING PROJECT**

KYCC purchased a 46-unit apartment building at 340 S. Reno Street to provide affordable housing in Koreatown, seeking to accommodate the fixed incomes of immigrant seniors.

#### **KOA BUILDING PURCHASE**

KYCC and four Koreatown nonprofit agencies purchased a six-story building at 3727 W. 6th Street. The goal of the interorganizational tenants was to create a one-stop community center for Koreatown.



#### NAME CHANGE REFLECTS GROWTH

In 2004, KYCC changed its name to "Koreatown Youth and Community Center" reflecting its commitment to serve all the diverse children, youth and families in Koreatown.

#### CHILDREN'S CENTER OPENS

After a \$2 million capital campaign, KYCC's Children's Center moved to its current Crenshaw Boulevard location, supporting our multiethnic families by offering on-site parent education, case management, mental health, and health services.

#### FREE TAX PREP PROGRAM BEGINS

KYCC's Free Tax Prep LA program started in 2006 with 10 volunteers from Hanmi Bank. That year, KYCC provided free tax preparation to 70 families.



#### MILLION TREES LOS ANGELES PARTNERS

With support from Los Angeles Mayor Villaraigosa's Million Trees Los Angeles (MTLA) program and Trees for a Green LA, funded by LADWP, KYCC has distributed and planted thousands of trees, increasing the green canopy in our community.

#### AFFORDABLE HOUSING EXPANDS FURTHER

In 2011, KYCC with Little Tokyo Service Center (LTSC) renovated five Section 8 apartments, adding 84 more units of low-income housing in Koreatown.

#### MENLO FAMILY HOUSING OPENS

KYCC, along with the Little Tokyo Service Center, built 60 units of affordable housing at 1230 S. Menlo Avenue, housing low-income families with KYCC providing after-school programs, family literacy, workforce training, and supportive services for its tenants.

#### **RECOVERY SERVICES LAUNCH**

**KYCC** launched its Recovery Services program, the first state-certified outpatient substance use disorder clinic in Koreatown, providing culturally and linguistically competent outpatient treatment for people facing drug and alcohol problems.



KYCC launched its Koreatown Storytelling Program, an intergenerational, multiethnic oral history and digital media program, teaching ethnographic and storytelling techniques to high school students and elders.

















#### ENHANCED CARE MANAGEMENT INTRODUCED

KYCC began its Enhanced Care Management (ECM) program, providing a whole-person-centered approach to healthcare for the high-needs members in our community.



#### FAMILYSOURCE CENTER OPENS

KYCC joins a network of FamilySource Centers across Los Angeles, providing a myriad of social, educational, employment, and family support services for low-income families.

#### **CLINICAL SERVICES** Provides culturally and linguistically appropriate counseling for low-income children, youth, and families. Services include therapy,

case management, and medication support in outpatient, school-based, and in-home settings. Also offers workshops, parenting groups, self-care events, and family gatherings.

#### **ENVIRONMENTAL SERVICES**

#### **COMMUNITY ECONOMIC** DEVELOPMENT

Helps families build financial stability through financial education, case management, and matched savings accounts. KYCC's

Free Tax Prep Los Angeles campaign assists nearly 13,500 households annually. The Small Business Development program offers free technical assistance to small businesses and entrepreneurs, while utility assistance programs help non-English speakers resolve billing issues.

#### **KIDS TOWN**

Offers quality early childhood education for 72 children ages 2.5 to 5. A play-based approach fosters selfesteem, independence, and

lifelong learning. The center operates year-round, Monday to Friday, from 7:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m., supporting working families.

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#### **PREVENTION EDUCATION**

Works to prevent underage alcohol, marijuana, and tobacco use in Koreatown, Pico-Union, Westlake, and Metro Los Angeles.

Funded by the County of Los Angeles Department of Public Health, the program addresses retail access, availability, and social norms contributing to substance use.

#### HOUSING SERVICES

Operates 390 affordable housing units across 12 projects, providing supportive services to unhoused and formerly

unhoused individuals. Additional programs include Intensive Case Management, Recovery Re-Housing, and a Community Food Program that distributes groceries and essentials.

#### **RECOVERY SERVICES**

**Provides outpatient** treatment for youth and adults struggling with drug and alcohol use. Treatment plans are personalized

and include counseling, case management, referrals, and recovery support to promote long-term success.

Free case management services through Medi-Cal to address physical, behavioral, and social service needs.

Case managers offer access and advocacy support. Eligible individuals must have Medi-Cal through LA Care, Anthem Blue Cross, or Health Net. Target populations are adults living with serious mental illness and/or substance use disorder, and children living with serious mental illness, substance use disorder, and/ or previous or current involvement in the child welfare system.

# CLINICAL SERVICES

## AAPI Mental Health Empowerment

KYCC Clinical Services participated in the AAPI Community Empowerment Project, which was created in response to the ongoing mental health needs of the AAPI community due to the rise in anti-Asian hate incidents and following the Monterey Park shooting incident in early 2023. Led by SSG SILVER, KYCC has come together in partnership with 11 other AAPI serving community organizations, to provide culturally sensitive mental health treatment, community education, and mental health promotion services across Los Angeles County in English, Spanish, and ten AAPI languages.

During the AAPI Community Empowerment Project's first year of collaboration, they participated in four community outreach events and were able to conduct outreach to 220 individuals. They also led one educational workshop focused on coping skills for high school youth, discussing stress and coping specific to the Korean and Korean-American community. To facilitate conversation amongst the youth, they utilized clips from Korean dramas and discussed how music can be used as a coping skill, followed by karaoke so youth could experientially practice coping. Through the collaborative, 36 individuals have been connected to mental health services outside of KYCC and 20 new individuals began mental health treatment at KYCC.

Mental health services and youth after-school programming were at the heart of Korean Youth Center (KYC) when it was founded in 1975, offering a culturally relevant space where newly immigrated Korean youth and their families could receive afterschool tutoring, summer enrichment programs, and counseling, along with parent education on navigating the school system, understanding child abuse policies, and engaging with the juvenile justice system.













# YOUTH SERVICES

## **Building Futures**

In 2024, KYCC Youth Services launched a paid internship program providing youth ages 14 to 24 with valuable work experience, training, and leadership development. Designed to support our youth in a successful transition into their career pathways, the program has already hosted 43 paid interns, totaling 2,789 internship hours.

This year, we also introduced seasonal camps during spring, summer and winter breaks, offering full-day childcare and enrichment activities for students during school holidays. Youth Services also proudly opened our doors to children on LAUSD administrative closure days, providing a safe and supportive space for children and ensuring families had reliable care when schools were closed.

Over the summer, KYCC's FamilySource Center hosted a structured SAT Prep Course for 14 high school students. Participants were introduced to the new Digital SAT format, completed two full-length practice tests, and received individualized coaching from an experienced SAT instructor. At the end of the course, several students improved their scores and felt more confident heading into their exams.

## **Growing a Greener LA**

In October 2023, KYCC Environmental Services launched the LA Tree Sustainability Initiative, to promote sustainability in our community, provide cooling of dense urban areas such as Koreatown, and help support Los Angeles's Green New Deal goal of planting 90,000 trees and increasing our tree canopy by at least 50% by the year 2028, in underserved communities with the least shade.

The City of Los Angeles is home to 4 million residents and there are more than 700,000 street trees, consisting of over 700 tree species, throughout the city. Street trees reduce pollution, provide cooling, save energy, and make our neighborhoods more livable. In addition to the planting of new trees, proper maintenance is essential for tree health and ensuring that trees do not injure pedestrians, damage property, or obstruct important signage.

Since launching the LA Tree Sustainability Initiative, KYCC Environmental Services has planted over 850 trees throughout Los Angeles.

In 1993, KYCC began collaborating with the LADWP's Low Flush Toilet Exchange program, distributing and installing over 1.2 million free lowflush toilets and showerheads over the next 15 years. Our energy efficient programming began in the early 2000s with the formation of Trees for a Green LA, now called City Plants, the official tree planting program for the City of Los Angeles. Since its inception, KYCC has planted and distributed over 20,000 trees to Los Angeles City residents.













## COMMUNITY ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

## **Expanding Tax Credit Access**

This past year, KYCC Community Economic Development participated in the countywide Claim Your Cash — Increase Tax-Credit Uptake collaborative project, which was recognized with two Los Angeles County Productivity and Quality Awards. The project received the Outstanding Teamwork Award and Bronze Eagle Award, placing 3rd out of 88 nominations.

As a key partner in Claim Your Cash, KYCC worked alongside Los Angeles County departments to boost awareness of tax credits and the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program. The project ensured that county employees and their clients were informed about free tax services and the financial benefits of filing.

Every year, Los Angeles County residents forgo close to an estimated \$600 million in federal tax credits, either by not filing their tax returns or not claiming their credits. Through strengthened collaboration, targeted outreach, and aligned messaging, the project helped low-income residents file over 12,000 additional tax returns, and secured an extra \$3.2 million in Earned Income Tax Credits (EITC) and Child Tax Credits (CTC), this past year.

KYCC's Free Tax Prep LA program started in 2006 with 10 volunteers from Hanmi Bank. That year, KYCC provided free tax preparation to 70 families. Since then, KYCC has grown to 150+ volunteers from 13 different bank partners and collaborates with over 40 non-profit agencies throughout Los Angeles. In 2024, KYCC's Free Tax Prep LA program served 20,000 families, bringing back over \$30 million in tax refunds and credits.

## **A Legacy of Learning**

This past year, KYCC's Kids Town preschool celebrated its 20-year anniversary. Following a \$2 million capital campaign, KYCC Kids Town officially opened in August of 2004, and with the support from the Carl & Roberta Deutsch Foundation, launched one of the first trilingual immersion program in Los Angeles.

Today, half of our students come from low-income families, speaking English, Korean, or Spanish as their primary language. To support their emotional and cognitive growth, Kids Town offers a play-based curriculum and an innovative Triple Language Immersion Program using PreGLAD strategies. This approach helps Korean- and Spanishspeaking children learn English, while English-speaking children gain exposure to Korean and Spanish, creating a rich multilingual learning environment.

Kids Town Preschool is proudly accredited by the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC) with an outstanding 94.77% score, underscoring our commitment to excellence. Over the years, we have served more than 475 children and their families, fostering a multicultural, mixed-age learning environment that nurtures intellectual development and emotional well-being.

## Championing a Smoke-Free Future

In 2024, KYCC Prevention Education's Breathe Initiative Coalition, a tobacco prevention coalition led by KYCC, celebrated the adoption of a 100% smoke, tobacco, and vape-free policy at Los Angeles Pierce College (LAPC). The result of four years of dedicated work by KYCC project staff, coalition members, interns, campus leaders, and supporters, this win marked a huge collaborative success for the coalition.

Through various community outreach and engagement strategies, from trainings and presentations, to tabling and hosting campus-wide events, Breathe Initiative Coalition was able to inform and educate LAPC on the benefits of having a smoke-free campus and the dangers of secondhand and thirdhand smoking. A result of all their dedication and work, Breathe Initiative Coalition received overall community support through smoke-free petitions, letters of support, and public opinion surveys. Since the policy adoption, Breathe Initiative Coalition has been supporting LAPC with increasing awareness of the new policy campuswide.

KYCC's alcohol and drug prevention work has been a cornerstone of our programming since 1975. In 1996, KYCC officially established its Youth Drug Abuse Prevention Program (YDAPP), aiming to raise awareness about problems related to tobacco, alcohol, and drug use among Korean American teenagers, a program that still serves youth in our community today.

## HOUSING SERVICES

## **Opening New Doors**

KYCC Housing Services continues to expand our efforts to support Los Angeles' unhoused community, working to build housing stability for our most vulnerable residents. In 2024, in partnership with Domus Development, Department of Health Services, Department of Mental Health, Los Angeles Housing Authority, and Los Angeles Homeless Service Authority, KYCC completed the lease up of 75 units of Permanent Supportive Housing at Serenity Apartments for chronically unhoused seniors. In addition to the 74 residents at this building, KYCC also provides housing case management services to 168 previously unhoused households to ensure our clients are given an opportunity to recover and thrive.

Through these efforts, KYCC remains committed to fostering long-term stability and providing the support necessary for our community members to rebuild their lives with dignity and hope. <image>



In April 1994, KYCC staff moved into the KYC Limited Partnership, a 19-unit low-income apartment building at 680 South Wilton Place, which marked a shift in the organization's priorities from gang prevention, family counseling, and athletic programs, towards housing development.









## RECOVERY SERVICES

## **Pathways to Change**

KYCC Recovery Services began their participation in the Recovery Incentive Program pilot project in October 2023, to provide Contingency Management services for our clients. Contingency Management is an evidence-based treatment that supports a path to recovery for individuals living with stimulant use disorder, by providing motivational incentives that recognize and reinforce positive behavioral change through negative drug tests.

Since beginning this program with Recovery Services clients, we have had a total of 55 participants, including seven who have completed 24 weeks of Contingency Management, and have provided 208 gift card incentives totaling \$8,363. Contingency Management is the only treatment for individuals with stimulant use disorder that has consistently shown strong results, including reduced or stopped drug use and improved treatment retention.

KYCC Recovery Services was launched in 2019, as the first state-certified outpatient substance use disorder clinic in Koreatown, providing culturally and linguistically competent outpatient treatment for people facing drug and alcohol problems.

## KOREATOWN Storytelling Program

## Amplifying LGBTQIA+ Voices

KYCC's Koreatown Storytelling Program 2023-24 cohort explored the LGBTQIA+ community in Koreatown. Recording multiethnic and multilingual LGBTQIA+ older adults in our community on their life experiences, their home countries, cultural traditions, childhood, faith, family, immigration and coming out (and not-coming out) narratives, intersectionality, discrimination, milestones and celebrations.

Many of KSP's workshops were taught by local artists, organizations, and community members with lived experience. KSP youth, interns, and staff conducted 41 oral history interviews with narrators from the Koreatown community. KSP also completed and printed KSP Volumes 3 and 4, which focused on substance use disorder, lived experience, and eldercare.

## Strengthening Community Support

In the last year, KYCC's Enhanced Care Management (ECM) marked two years of service to our community. ECM has served 110 clients across the program's current lifespan, including 24% of clients who were of the older adult (60+) population, as well as a majority being monolingual Korean speakers. This capacity to serve the Korean community is a special asset that KYCC brings to the Managed Care Plans that we contract with, and we continue to be depended upon to support in this role, in a capacity that few other ECM providers in Los Angeles are able to do.

ECM takes a whole-person approach to managing complex health needs. A free Medi-Cal benefit, ECM provides clients of all ages with a Lead Care Manager to help them engage with and manage their health needs, providing assistance with navigating the intricacies of the healthcare system and addressing all aspects of health, including the social determinants of health such as housing and financial stability. By linking participants to essential services and resources, ECM empowers them to take control of their health and build long-term stability.

## A New Chapter of Support

- This past year, KYCC proudly opened its Wilshire
  FamilySource Center (FSC), located at Menlo Family Center, expanding our commitment to empowering low-income
   families in Los Angeles. Joining a network of 18 other FSC's
   throughout Los Angeles, KYCC's FSC provides a range of
   vital services including financial coaching, youth academic
   support, parenting workshops, and access to public benefits.
- CM As a trusted resource hub, KYCC's FSC has made a meaningful impact, serving over 1,000 children and families with culturally and linguistically responsive support for our families. From financial literacy workshops that have helped parents build economic stability, to our youth programs offering tutoring and college prep support, FSC is committed to strengthening families and uplifting our community. As we continue to grow, we look forward to providing families with access to critical resources that promote their long-term well-being.
