

In 2025, KYCC celebrated its 50th anniversary, marking five decades of service to Koreatown and greater Los Angeles. Since our founding in 1975, KYCC has worked to ensure that every resident of Koreatown feels seen, heard, and supported through the challenges of raising a family in an evolving and ever-changing neighborhood.

Over the past 50 years, our work has grown alongside the community we serve. From providing trilingual early childhood education and culturally responsive mental health counseling, to helping families remain stably housed, planting trees to bring shade to neighborhood streets, and investing in the next generation of leaders, KYCC continues to meet families where they are. Over the past 50 years, we have served more than 500,000 Angelenos, guided by the belief that when families are healthy and supported, our community can truly thrive.

## WHO WE SERVE

KYCC is committed to serving the diverse communities of Koreatown and beyond. In 2025, we provided support to over 23,700 youth and families, across 12 locations and 12 affordable housing projects. # OUR SERVICES

KYCC offers a wide range of programs to support the well-being of individuals and families in our community. From mental health counseling and youth education, to financial empowerment, environmental initiatives, and housing support, our services are designed to meet the diverse needs of those we serve.




## CLINICAL SERVICES

Provides culturally and linguistically appropriate counseling for low-income children, youth, and families. Services include therapy, case management, and medication support in outpatient, school-based, and in-home settings. The program also hosts workshops, parenting groups, self-care events, and family gatherings.



## COMMUNITY ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Helps families build financial stability through financial education, case management, and matched savings accounts. KYCC's Free Tax Prep Los Angeles campaign assists nearly 13,500 households annually. The Small Business Development program offers free technical assistance to small businesses and entrepreneurs, while utility assistance programs help non-English speakers resolve billing issues.



## ENHANCED CARE MANAGEMENT

Free case management services through Medi-Cal to address physical, behavioral, and social service needs. Lead Care Managers facilitate access to health care and provide advocacy and support services. Target populations are adults and children living with serious mental illness, substance use disorder, or involvement in the child welfare system.




## ENVIRONMENTAL SERVICES

Engages communities in creating safer, healthier, and greener neighborhoods. KYCC leads tree plantings, conservation education, community clean-ups, and makes graffiti removal services available to the community seven days a week. Through these efforts, KYCC helps make Los Angeles a cleaner and more livable city.



## FAMILYSOURCE CENTER

Offers social, educational, employment, and family support services to help low-income families build stability. Programs focus on asset building, housing stabilization, and academic success for youth and adults.




## HOUSING SERVICES

Operates 390 affordable housing units across 12 projects, providing supportive services to unhoused and formerly unhoused individuals. Additional programs include Intensive Case Management, Time Limited Subsidies, and a Community Food Program that distributes groceries and essentials.



## KIDS TOWN PRESCHOOL

Offers quality early childhood education for 72 children ages 2 to 5. A play-based approach fosters self-esteem, independence, and lifelong learning. The center operates year-round, Monday to Friday, from 8:00 a.m. to 5:30 p.m., to support working families.



## RECOVERY SERVICES

Provides outpatient treatment for youth and adults struggling with drug and alcohol use. Treatment plans are personalized and include counseling, case management, referrals, and recovery support to promote long-term success.



## KOREATOWN STORYTELLING PROGRAM

A multilingual, intergenerational initiative teaching high school students and elders storytelling techniques. The program documents marginalized narratives, explores cultural practices, and strengthens community connections.



## PREVENTION EDUCATION

Works to prevent underage alcohol, marijuana, and tobacco use in Koreatown, Pico-Union, Westlake, and Metro Los Angeles. Funded by the County of Los Angeles Department of Public Health, the program addresses retail access, availability, and social norms contributing to substance use.



## YOUTH SERVICES

Supports academic achievement and personal growth through out-of-school programs for low-income children. Youth development programs provide life skills, leadership opportunities, and family support. Offerings include K-12 academic support, seasonal camps, high school leadership programs, and paid internships.




## COMMUNITY ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

KYCC's Small Business Development program provided critical support to Korean- and Spanish-speaking small business owners and street vendors impacted by the devastation following the Southern California wildfires. Our Small Business Counselors were on-site at disaster relief centers, providing more than 650 technical assistance consultations and helping 380 businesses secure over \$300,000 in grants and disaster loans. These efforts supported the creation of 64 new businesses, generated more than 100 new jobs, and helped retain over 500 existing jobs—transforming crisis into opportunity.

## CLINICAL SERVICES

Clinical Services significantly expanded its creative outreach in 2025, participating in 35 community events and engaging 2,677 children, youth, and families across Los Angeles. Through youth-friendly, activity-based workshops offered at local schools and community centers, staff provided education on managing stress, healthy relationships, boundaries, self-esteem, and mental health—receiving strong positive feedback from participants. The team also deepened long-standing partnerships through consistent presence at community events and resource fairs.



## ENHANCED CARE MANAGEMENT

Enhanced Care Management expanded its impact in the past year by partnering with over 50 community organizations across sectors including physical health, behavioral health, housing, and children's services. The program grew its enrollment by over 40%, supported clients in attending 95% of their scheduled medical appointments, and achieved a 30% reduction in emergency room visits, improving health outcomes and access to coordinated care for the community members that we serve.



## ENVIRONMENTAL SERVICES

Through the K-Town Beautiful campaign, Environmental Services continued to empower residents to take action for a cleaner, healthier Koreatown. In partnership with the Office of Community Beautification, the program organized regular volunteer clean-ups that brought neighbors together, raised awareness of free citywide services, and encouraged long-term community stewardship. These collective efforts reduced waste, improved environmental health, and strengthened community pride—helping build a more vibrant and sustainable Koreatown for everyone.

## FAMILYSOURCE CENTER

KYCC's Wilshire FamilySource Center (FSC) served more than 2,600 individuals, providing comprehensive case management to over 200 households. Our FSC helped 70 youth strengthen academic achievement and supported 531 clients in improving their financial stability. As food insecurity remains a pressing issue for many families, we continued to distribute monthly groceries to ensure access to essential resources. Through these efforts, KYCC's FSC brought \$1.3 million in resources back to our families and remains a critical support system for them—and a reminder of the ongoing need to expand services for our community.



## HOUSING SERVICES

KYCC expanded peer-led healing and recovery spaces at our housing units, strengthening resident connection and empowerment. The Women's Support Groups at Serenity grew from two to ten active attendees, meeting twice a month to provide a safe, supportive space to address issues such as trauma, domestic violence, parenting stress, financial instability, and emotional wellness. At Ambrose, weekly AA/NA meetings continue to thrive, led by residents with more than 10 years of sobriety who offer authentic, peer-driven support. Participation has steadily increased, drawing residents and community members, with several outside participants stepping up as sponsors. With a long-term vision of becoming tenant-led, the groups are fostering leadership, shared lived experience, and community resilience.



## KIDS TOWN PRESCHOOL

Kids Town Preschool strengthened its focus on social-emotional development by creating Cozy Corners in every classroom and outdoor play area, with support from UCLA Applied Developmental Psychology student interns and our Kids Town Parent Advisory Committee. Grounded in research-based practices, these calming spaces help children pause, reflect, and practice self-regulation through thoughtfully designed environments featuring soft seating, calming colors, books, and sensory materials. By fostering emotional awareness, resilience, and positive decision-making, Cozy Corners support children's ability to engage in learning and build healthy relationships. Families have shared that children are carrying these calming strategies home, demonstrating the lasting impact of this initiative beyond the preschool classroom.



## PROGRAM MILESTONES (CONT.)



### KOREATOWN STORYTELLING PROGRAM

Koreatown Storytelling Program (KSP) explored the traditional healing arts and conducted 62 interviews, learning from the diversity of healing practices and modalities from our largely Latine and API community, which will include oral history interviews and workshops with acupuncturists, herbalists, shamans, botanicas, and curanderas from our neighborhood. This project will continue the work we are doing on The K-Town Atlas, a collection of digital StoryMaps documenting the history, culture, and people of Koreatown and neighboring communities. From Legacies of Western Avenue to the history and context of the 1992 Los Angeles Civil Unrest and more maps coming soon, the atlas documents interview audio recordings and transcripts from business members, residents, and community members who share their personal histories and experiences in Koreatown.

### PREVENTION EDUCATION

This year, Prevention Education organized 51 intergenerational events, conducted 178 workshops, carried out 136 outreach efforts, and engaged more than 6,669 new participants across diverse age groups. Nearly 1,150 educational materials—including billboards, radio ads, newsletters, social media posts, coasters, and age stickers—were disseminated to strengthen prevention awareness. We engaged over 80 youth, ages 14 to 26, across five youth groups—YDAPP, LATAT, MYPARC, KARS, and KPWR—who contributed more than 6,000 hours addressing substance use and other social drivers of health in the Koreatown, Pico Union, and Westlake communities. Additionally, advocacy by our Breathe Initiative Coalition led to the passage of a comprehensive tobacco-free policy at Pierce College, promoting smoke-free spaces and student well-being.



### RECOVERY SERVICES

Through the Koreatown Access to Recovery Services (KARS), a joint project between KYCC's Recovery Services, Prevention Education, and Koreatown Storytelling Program, we reached 1,033 community members through outreach, workshops, and events, distributing 705 naloxone kits and 1,031 fentanyl test strips to support harm reduction. The program strengthened staff capacity with evidence-based practice trainings, resulting in a newly Certified Medi-Cal Peer Support Specialist, and implemented a 10-month youth empowerment program with 12 high school students who educated the community about substance use, conducted interviews with individuals in recovery, and reduced stigma. Inspired by the quote "Tomorrow is Today," their storytelling and media campaign promoted KYCC Recovery Services and celebrated National Recovery Month, emphasizing that recovery is possible.



### YOUTH SERVICES

This past year marked a year of growth for KYCC Youth Services, with 30 interns completing over 2,715 hours of service and receiving \$47,000 in compensation. Our 50 graduating high school seniors are now attending universities such as USC, UCLA, Brown University, UC Riverside, UC Davis, Cal Poly Pomona, Cal State LA, East Los Angeles College, Santa Monica College, and Los Angeles City College—reflecting the strong academic pathways for success that our programs help nurture.



### HIGHLIGHT

## Strengthening a Legacy Through Small Business Support

One of the unique strengths of Koreatown is its vibrant network of mom-and-pop shops and family-owned businesses. Within just three square miles, more than 5,000 businesses line our streets—offering familiar flavors, trusted services, and cultural traditions that reflect the diversity of our Koreatown community. KYCC's Small Business Program is dedicated to supporting these local entrepreneurs by providing the tools, guidance, and resources they need to build strong, sustainable businesses.

Moorimgoong (MRG) is a traditional and mixed martial arts academy that has been rooted in the Koreatown area for over 30 years. Founded by Great Grandmaster Yong Moon and Grandmaster Ari Moon, MRG teaches Moorimdo, a hybrid martial art drawing from Kung Fu, Tang Soo Do, Karate, and Tae Kwon Do. After three decades of leadership under its founders, the academy

entered a new chapter under the guidance of their son, David Moon, a Koreatown native and graduate of Wilton Place Elementary School and John Burroughs Middle School.

As David assumed responsibility for MRG's business operations, he turned to KYCC's Small Business Program for support. Through one-on-one counseling, KYCC worked with MRG to strengthen their financial management practices, improve business operations, and develop a sustainable growth strategy. The program also connected MRG to community-based resources and networking opportunities, helping enhance their visibility and credibility within the community.



With KYCC's support, MRG has stabilized its operations and is now well-positioned for continued growth—ensuring that this long-standing community institution can continue sharing the sport of martial arts for decades to come.

## Connecting Generations Through Culture and Care

Since 2020, KYCC has expanded its commitment to building meaningful intergenerational connections within Koreatown. Made possible by the generous support from The Eisner Foundation, our Clinical Services and Koreatown Storytelling Program (KSP) found ways to bridge generational divides and foster shared learning, healing, and enrichment across our community.

As part of our intergenerational efforts, KSP explored traditional healing arts to honor and learn from the diverse cultural practices present in Koreatown’s Latina/o/x and Asian Pacific Islander communities. Over the course of ten months, KSP engaged in-depth workshops on oral history and ethnographic methods, a historical overview of the community, and interviews and workshops exploring traditional healing with acupuncturists, herbalists, shamans, botanicas, and curanderas from our Korean, Mexican, Indigenous, Salvadoran, Guatemalan, and Black populations.

“I already knew that Koreatown was a special place that held many generations of experiences and knowledge,” shared one student. “However, actually being able to capture it has changed my perspective. I have learned to see deep and rich stories in every business, person, and practice I encounter.”

KYCC’s Clinical Services program deepened its intergenerational approach to mental health care by increasing the number of family therapy sessions offered. Historically placing an emphasis on individual therapy, our clinicians received training in intergenerational trauma led by Yellow Chair Collective, helping them feel more confident in providing more family therapy for Korean and Latina/o/x immigrant families. These trainings strengthened staff confidence and capacity to address trauma within a family-centered, intergenerational framework.

For KYCC, intergenerational connections are not just about bringing different age groups together, they are about promoting empathy, reducing isolation, and strengthening cross-cultural understanding. As we continue this work, we hope to deepen opportunities for shared healing and connection, to help our community grow stronger across generations.

## Celebrating Community Through Partnership




